Osha Guidelines For Medical Offices

The following requirements include those that normally apply to medical and dental offices, whether there are 2 or 200 employees. Additional OSHA standards may apply to some offices. The complete text of the regulations can be found in Title 29 of the Code of Federal Regulations (29 CFR).

OSHA requirements for offices are less complex than for the manufacturing industry, but they still need to be met and are monitored by OSHA. Common issues that OSHA is involved in offices include fire hazards, structural integrity, illumination, temperature and health safety protocols.

Reply: When there is occupational exposure to blood or other potentially infectious materials (OPIM), the OSHA bloodborne pathogens standard, 29 CFR 1910.1030, requires the employer to provide, at no cost to the employee,

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APPROPRIATE personal protective equipment such as, but not limited to, gloves, gowns, eye protection, shoe covers, laboratory coats, or other equipment deemed necessary [See 29 CFR 1910.1030 (d) (3) (i)].

The Occupation Safety & Health Act enforces regulations for managing bloodborne pathogens, radiation and the disposal of sharp instruments in medical facilities. Six OSHA regulations affect physicians' offices. A seventh regulation pertains to offices that offer radiation services.
